# QG's Wildlife Residents, by Dave Franck

e watched the animals up here closely this past year to see who came by, how they developed and how they changed their habits throughout

the year. Here's a picture of some of the turkeys that meander by the house from time to time. These are interesting because we watched this group of females from last spring when they had three grown hens and 13 little chicks. We watched as the hens taught the chicks how to find food and how to scatter when given the danger signal. We



also watched as the chicks decreased in number as predators and nature reduced them to just seven and as the remaining chicks grew into the hens in the picture. The hen flock stayed to themselves until mating season, when two toms joined them, including the Alpha Tom in the picture. He will soon leave the herd and spend the rest of the year on his own and, in a couple of months, we'll again get to enjoy spring's new chicks growing and learning.

nother animal staple here are the deer. We've watched as the separate herds of spring females and fawns grew and then combined into larger herds in the fall and then were joined by the bucks for rutting. This picture actually contains nine deer with the one buck in the middle of the picture just to the right of the tree. As if he could not have enough does following him around through the woods all day and night, shortly after this picture was taken, the buck picked up a scent and wandered off to the



left and went after two more does that were just over the hill crest (unseen to us at the time) and pursued them.

1 can black beans, drained


1/2 C. brown rice
